

From the Social Action Coordinator

Interrupting the School-to-Prison Pipeline and Ending Mass Incarceration are two social action initiatives of United Women in Faith. Several members of Harpeth River District units attended the July 12th screening of **PUSHOUT: The Criminalization of Black Girls in School** at McKendree UMC in Nashville. The film is powerful and eye-opening! The group followed the viewing with an inspiring discussion and lovely lunch. Thank you to the TWK Conference United Women in Faith and McKendree United Methodist Church for hosting.

As a follow-up, here are some ways you may be able to support Interrupting the School-to-Prison Pipeline and Ending Mass Incarceration in Middle Tennessee.

- Consider being a tutor during or after school in your community. Contact a nearby elementary school or after school care program to see how you may be able to help.
- Organize a group to do a Bible Study on the School-to-Prison Pipeline using resources provided at the UWFAITH website: <https://uwfaithresources.org/prodDetail.cfm?productID=10393&catid=2210>
- Family Reconciliation Center is a guest house in Nashville located near both Riverbend Maximum Security Institution and Debra K. Johnson Rehabilitation Institution - state prisons for men and women. Families can stay at the guest house FOR FREE when visiting loved ones who are incarcerated at these prisons, in area jails, or while living in transitional communities. Statistics show that visitation helps reduce recidivism significantly and the FRC guest house is a wonderful place of hospitality. More here: <https://www.familyreconciliationcenter.org/>



2025 Mission u

In case you missed it, the theme of Mission u this year was "Practicing Hope Together." I'd like to share three thoughts from the discussions we had in the class I was in.

First, in 1-2 words or a short phrase, define hope. Easy, right? Well, not if you really get to thinking about it. Actually, it turns out to be a little complicated. Here are some of the responses from the class: Anticipation. Future oriented. Possibilities. Light at the end of the tunnel. Assurance.

Second, active hope. On page 37 in our study book, there is a transcript of a clip from the podcast *Finding Our Way* where Mariame Kaba shares her thoughts about hope. "Hope isn't a ... substitute for action, but a basis for it. ... Like for me, hope doesn't reside. Hope isn't like a thing. It is also not an emotion. It's not something that I have. It's something that I do."

Third, a mustard seed. We are all familiar with the parable of the mustard seed in Matthew 12:31-32. With this, I'm going to leave you with two questions:

- Is Hope the seed to Joy?
- Is Hope the seed to Faith?

**Small-Scale Grant Opportunity for Districts and Units
Working to Interrupt the School-to-Prison Pipeline**

Deadline to Apply: September 1, 2025

The Office of Racial Justice invites United Women in Faith Districts and Units to apply for funding to support their local work to interrupt the school-to-prison pipeline and/or end mass incarceration.

Goal of Funding Support

To advance United Women in Faith's efforts to interrupt the school-to-prison pipeline and end mass incarceration by providing small-scale seed funding to support district and local unit projects.

Available Funding Support

Consideration will be given to funding requests of \$100 - \$1,500. Funding is limited. Please budget responsibly and request only the amount needed. Requests for funding support in excess of \$1,500 will not be considered.

Criteria for Evaluating Applications for Funding Support

Your project should have a **clear goal** connected to interrupting the school-to-prison pipeline and/or ending mass incarceration. Goals may be at any level, from changing the practice of an individual school to shifting federal juvenile justice policy. Project goals should demonstrate a healthy mix of ambition and realism. Your project should **include the voices of directly-impacted people** in the leadership and/or decision-making process. Depending on your specific context, this may include students at risk of pushout, currently- or formerly-incarcerated people, or others.

We believe we do our best and most sustainable work when we work together. With that in mind, United Women in Faith groups are welcome to apply for funding to support **collaborative work** in coalition/partnership with other local organizations, as long as the work involves substantial and active participation from the United Women in Faith Unit or District, as well.

Groups that receive funding will be asked to report on their results, including:

- What was done;
- Who was involved;
- How the community was impacted;
- How funds were spent;
- What next steps are planned; and
- What was learned.

Timeline

- **Application deadline - September 1, 2025**
- Groups notified of funding support decisions - By October 15, 2025
- Groups confirm plan to move forward (or not) - By November 1, 2025
- Selected group(s) receive funding - By December 15, 2025
- Implementation of project - Calendar Year 2026
- Report on results due - By February 1, 2027

THE DEATH and LIFE of AIDA HERNANDEZ: A BORDER STORY

Aaron Bobrow-Strain

This book tells the story of a Mexican teen mother, Aida, journeying through the U.S. immigration system and the obstacles she faces. Aida was born in Mexico in 1987. When Aida was 8 years old, her mother took her and her siblings to live in Arizona, where she grew up undocumented. After her deportation, Aida found herself in a Mexican city marked by violence, in a country not hers, and separated from her son. To get back to the United States and reunite with her son, she embarked on a harrowing journey, enduring detention centers, immigration courts, and more.

I AM a GIRL FROM AFRICA: A MEMOIR of POWER, COMMUNITY and HOPE

Aelizabeth Nyamayaro

When she was eight years old, a severe drought hit Nyamayaro's village in Zimbabwe. Unable to move from hunger and malnourishment, she encountered a United Nations aid worker who gave her a bowl of warm porridge and saved her life—a transformative moment that inspired her to dedicate herself to giving back to her community, continent, and world. Nyamayaro's incredible memoir takes readers from the near-death experience of an African girl to a lifelong dedication to real change. It is a story of persevering through great odds and finding one's true calling while delivering an important message of hope, empowerment, and interdependence.

Nurturing Community

A LITTLE PIECE of LIGHT: A MEMOIR of HOPE, PRISON and LIFE UNBOUND

Donna Hylton

Donna Hylton's early life was a nightmare of abuse. In 1986, she took part in a horrific act and was sentenced to 25 years to life for kidnapping and second-degree murder. This tells the tale of her journey back to life as she faced the truth about the crime that locked her away for 27 years, as well as the family she found inside prison that ultimately saved her. Alongside this generation's most infamous criminals, she learned to fight, then thrive. Since her release in 2012, she has emerged as a leading advocate for criminal justice reform and women's rights.

THE NICKEL BOYS / LOS CHICOS DE NICKEL

Colson Whitehead

When Elwood Curtis, a Black boy in 1960s Tallahassee, is unfairly sentenced to a juvenile reformatory called the Nickel Academy, he finds himself trapped in a chamber of horrors. Elwood's only salvation is his friendship with fellow "delinquent" Turner, which deepens despite Turner's conviction that Elwood is hopelessly naive, the world is crooked, and the only way to survive is to scheme and avoid trouble. Based on the real story of a reform school that operated for 111 years and warped the lives of thousands, *The Nickel Boys* dramatizes another strand of American history through the story of two boys unjustly sentenced.

Tessa Afshar

Before she stole healing by touching the hem of his garment, Elianna was a young girl crushed by guilt. After her only brother is killed in her care, Elianna tries to earn forgiveness by working for her father's textile trade and caring for her family. When another tragedy places Elianna in sole charge of the business, her talent for design brings enormous success, but never absolution. Then illness strikes, isolating Elianna from everyone and stripping everything she has left. No physician can cure her—until she hears whispers of a man whose mere touch can heal.

THE SUN DOES SHINE: HOW I FOUND LIFE and FREEDOM on DEATH ROW

Anthony Ray Hinton

In 1985, Hinton was arrested and charged with two counts of capital murder in Alabama. Stunned, he knew it was a case of mistaken identity. But with no money and a different system of justice for a poor Black man in the South, Hinton was sentenced to death by electrocution. He spent his first three years on Death Row in agonizing despair and anger. But as Hinton realized and accepted his fate, he resolved not only to survive but find a way to live, becoming a beacon to his fellow inmates, 54 of whom were executed mere feet from his cell. Hinton won his release in 2015.


Centerville ~

Lawrenceburg First ~

The UWF of Lawrenceburg FUMC approved its budget for 2025 for \$8,720.00. This allows us to provide for our Community Missions, Youth/Children fund (\$1,000), a \$1,000 scholarship for a graduating senior, our church's Food Pantry, Reading Program Awards, and many other activities.

We installed our UWF Executive Committee officers in February at our Unit meeting and had a guest speaker from the Center of Hope, followed by a reception in our parlor. We were able to give \$375 to the Center along with a donation. February was also our two-weekend Yard Sale where we cleared \$4,312.50 - this will help to fund our numerous projects during the year.

In March we hosted the first noon Lenten Service for our county and lunch. We provided a "brown bag lunch" of either chicken salad/pimento salad sandwich, chips, cookies, and a drink.

We will begin our meetings again in August to prepare for the rest of 2025!

Nolensville First ~

The Nolensville First UWF had a speaker from Quilts of Valor, a nonprofit which makes and presents handmade quilts to war veterans, some of whom are members of our church. Each honoree is wrapped in their quilt at the presentation.

A member of the UWF is part of the group of quilters donating time and materials to construct the quilts. Our speaker, Robert St. John, has a computerized long arm which he programs with his designs to machine quilt the quilts.



Thompson's Station ~

Thompson's Station has had several different programs this past year. One of our programs related directly to our church's 152-year-old history.

Sophie Reilly Hatton served as the first Sunday School teacher in the early days of our church, which was founded in 1873. She served as the first female state librarian for Tennessee around 1878. She was married Brigadier General Robert Hatton who served in the Civil War and was killed at the Battle of Seven Pines. While only the basics were known about Sophie, one of our church members had the opportunity to go and explore items belonging to her whenever the family cleaned out a cabin in Georgia. There, our member found diaries, clothes, and memorabilia which had belonged to Mrs. Hatton. From these materials, she was able to piece together a more in-depth look at this interesting lady. She and her friends came and presented "Finding Sophie Reilly Hatton" to our women's meeting complete with Civil War attire. It was a wonderful presentation.
